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Teaching Notes – Music

Song: Amazing grace!

Good choice for	Any time
Starting points	Warmups: <ul style="list-style-type: none">• ‘Funky chicken’ - physical warmup• Lip trills up and down a scale
Things to look out for	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Make sure vowels sounds are elongated to make the phrases well-connected and have a sense of direction and purpose.• To achieve the above, ask the children to say the words of the song, imitating the Queen.
Scoring / performance / instrumental suggestions	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Endless options for this song.• Solo voice with piano accompaniment• SATB choir with piano and/or organ + bass guitar.• One option is to have a solo voice with piano accompaniment for the first verse, adding choir and instruments for the second verse, dropping down to just voices for the third verse and then bringing together all voices and instruments for the fourth verse.• The flute could be played by an oboe or violin or transposed for a clarinet or alto saxophone.
Focus / Technical focus	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Elongated vowels, giving a melody and phrase a sense of direction and purpose.
Specialist language meanings	Scale - any set of musical notes ordered by fundamental frequency or pitch. A scale ordered by increasing pitch is an ascending scale, and a scale ordered by decreasing pitch is a descending scale. Transpose - Changing the key of a piece of music. SATB - Soprano, Alto, Tenor, Bass

Teaching Notes – Faith

Hymn: Amazing Grace

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As we sing this hymn, we are reminded just how powerful and loving God is, that no matter how lost or bad we might feel, God's grace is always there to save us and give us a new start. We should trust in God's love and forgiveness, knowing that God will always guide us through life's challenges.

Verse 1

Bible reference:

Ephesians 2. 8-9

Luke 15. 24 (context Luke 15. 11-32)

God's grace (loving care and kindness) is something which we cannot earn but is something God gives freely to every one of us. It is so wonderful that it is like hearing our favourite music!

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The idea of being 'lost' then 'found' says that life without God's guidance is like being on the wrong path, going the wrong way. In the Bible, Jesus tells the parable of The Prodigal (Lost) Son which demonstrates how happy God is when people change their ways.

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Verse 2

Bible reference:

Proverbs 9. 10 There are two different kinds of 'fear' spoken of in this verse. In the first line, 'fear' means respect for God and understanding how important it is to follow God. The Bible says, 'The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom' (Proverbs 9. 10); from this we can see how God's grace enables us to make better choices ourselves. In the second line, John Newton is speaking of scary 'fears', and how these were taken away by the sense of peace he felt when he knew God was with him. 'Twas = it was

Verse 3

Bible reference:

Psalms 23. 4 In this verse, John Newton reflects on all the dangers and troubles he faced in his life, like the storm at sea, and tells how he believes that God's grace kept him safe and will continue to guide him until he reaches his final 'home', which means heaven. Psalm 23 in the Bible also speaks of God always being with us, even in tough times. 'Tis = it is
